If you have noticed Mesquite trees having a dark coloration, sap, and branches dying, the culprit may be the larva of the flat-headed borer. Borers primarily affect stressed trees, which seems to be the case with what we are seeing in the Mesquite tree population due to last year's extreme drought that occurred in Winkler and Loving Counties. After communicating with Dr. Mark Muegge, it was pointed out that most landscape trees should be unaffected by the larva since these trees received significantly less stress due to common watering practices and tree management provided to the trees we consider as "wanted". The image above shows the larva of the flat-headed borer and they are very easily recognized when found on the tree. The damage is even more evident because it will look like a maze of tunnels once the weak bark is removed around the trees. With further inspection you will most likely be able to locate the larva itself.



Preparedness Toolkit

Water, one gallon of water per person per day for at least 3 days

Food, at least a 3 day supply of non-perishable food

Radio, battery or hand crank powered

Flashlight, with extra batteries

First Aid Kit

Whistle, to signal for help

Dust Mask, to filter contaminated air

Moist Towelettes, Garbage Bags, & Plastic Ties, for personal sanitation

Wrench or Pliers, to turn off utilities

Manual Can Opener

Local Maps

<u>Cell Phone</u>, with inverter or solar charger
